Article: Students Outrunning Faculty in Al Use

"Nearly half of college students are using AI tools this fall, but fewer than a quarter (22 percent) of faculty members use them, the report from Tyton Partners finds. On AI, 'students seem to be more curious about it than instructors, and those using it daily are using it in and out of schools; that made us think it might be ubiquitous moving forward,' said Cathy Shaw, a director at Tyton. 'The differential between student use and instructor use will be one to watch.'"
